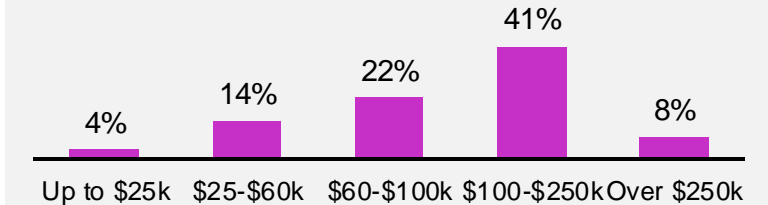

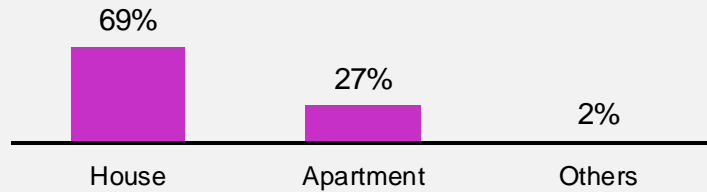

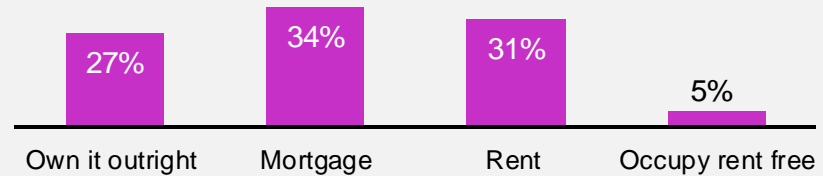

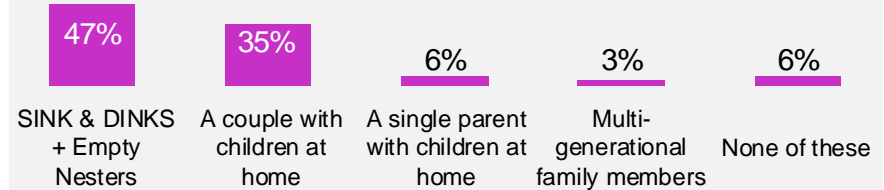

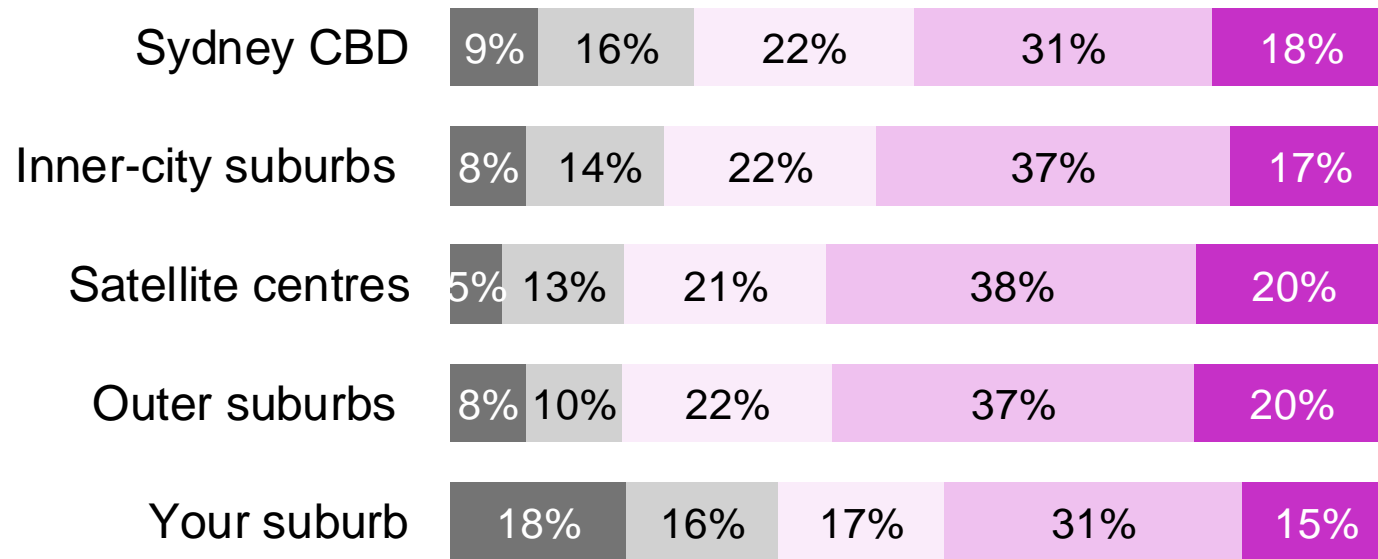

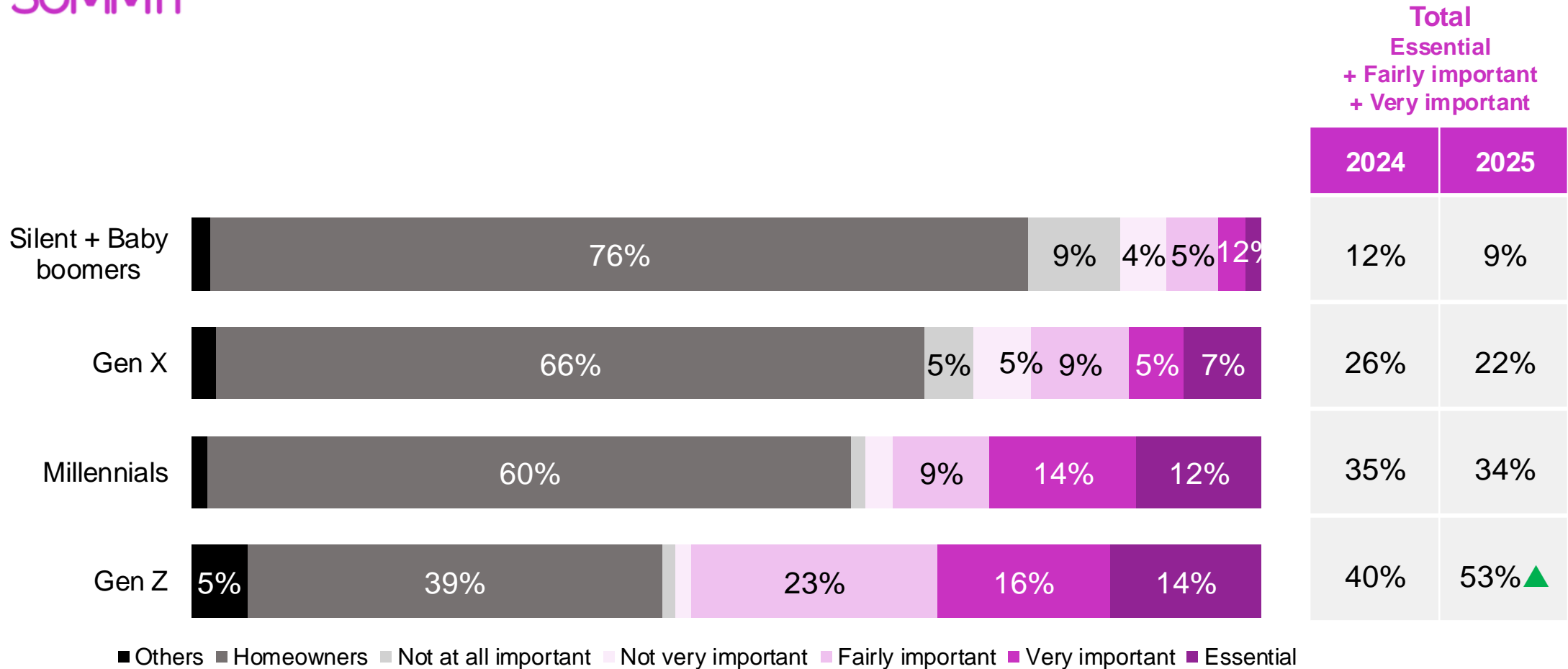


Q40. To what extent do you support or oppose increasing the density of development in each of the following areas of Sydney over the next 10 years?

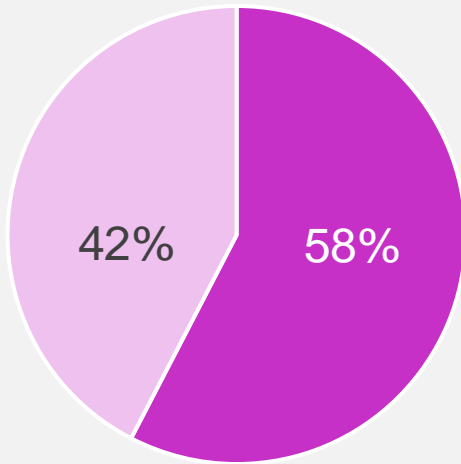

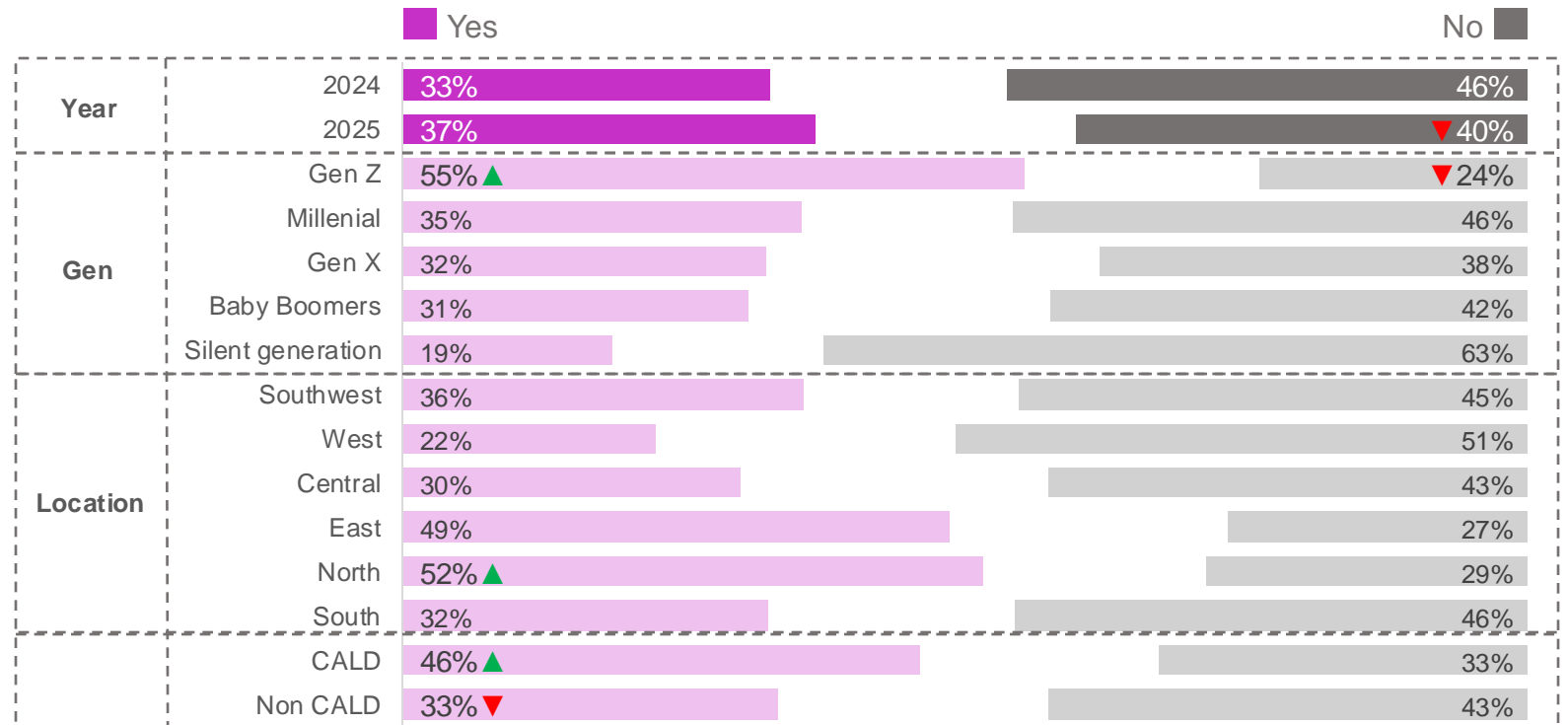

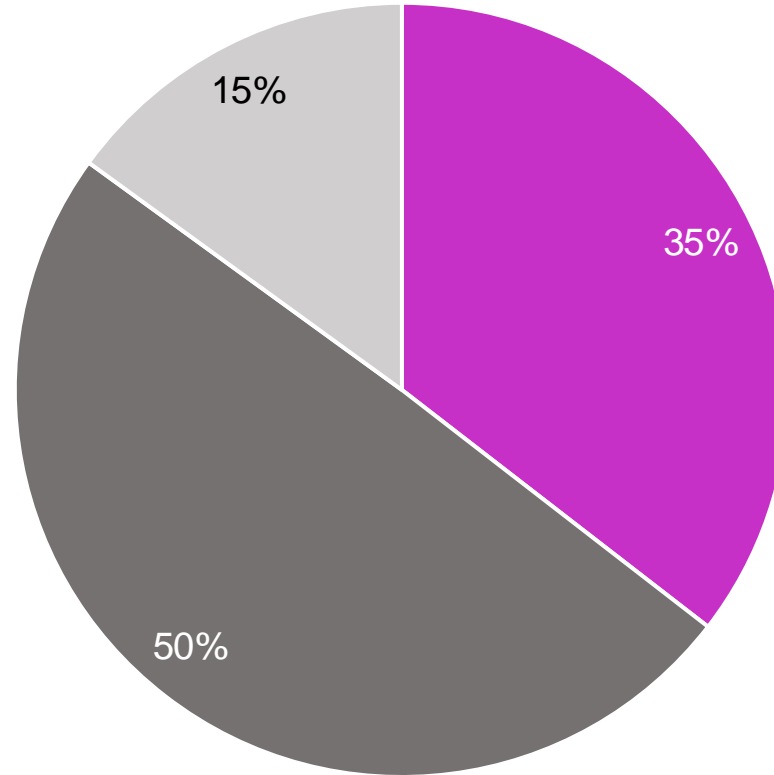

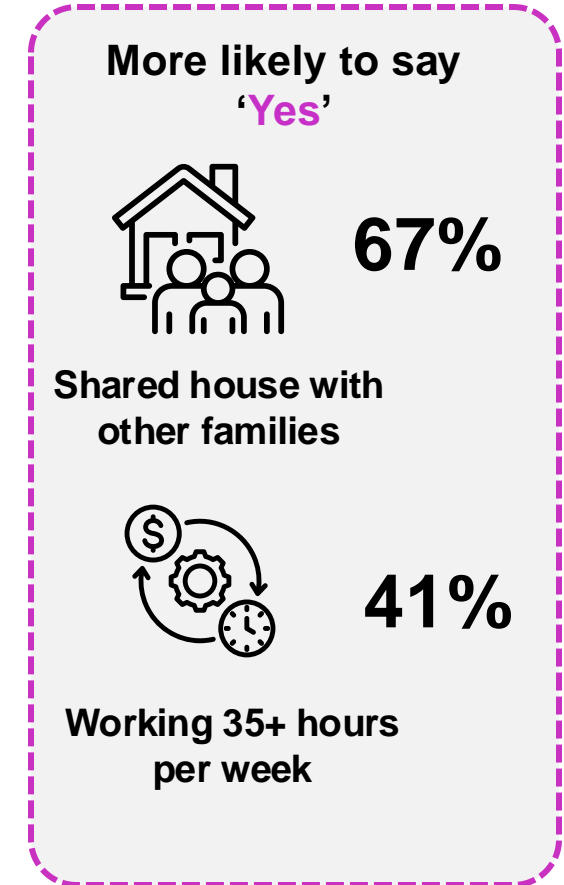

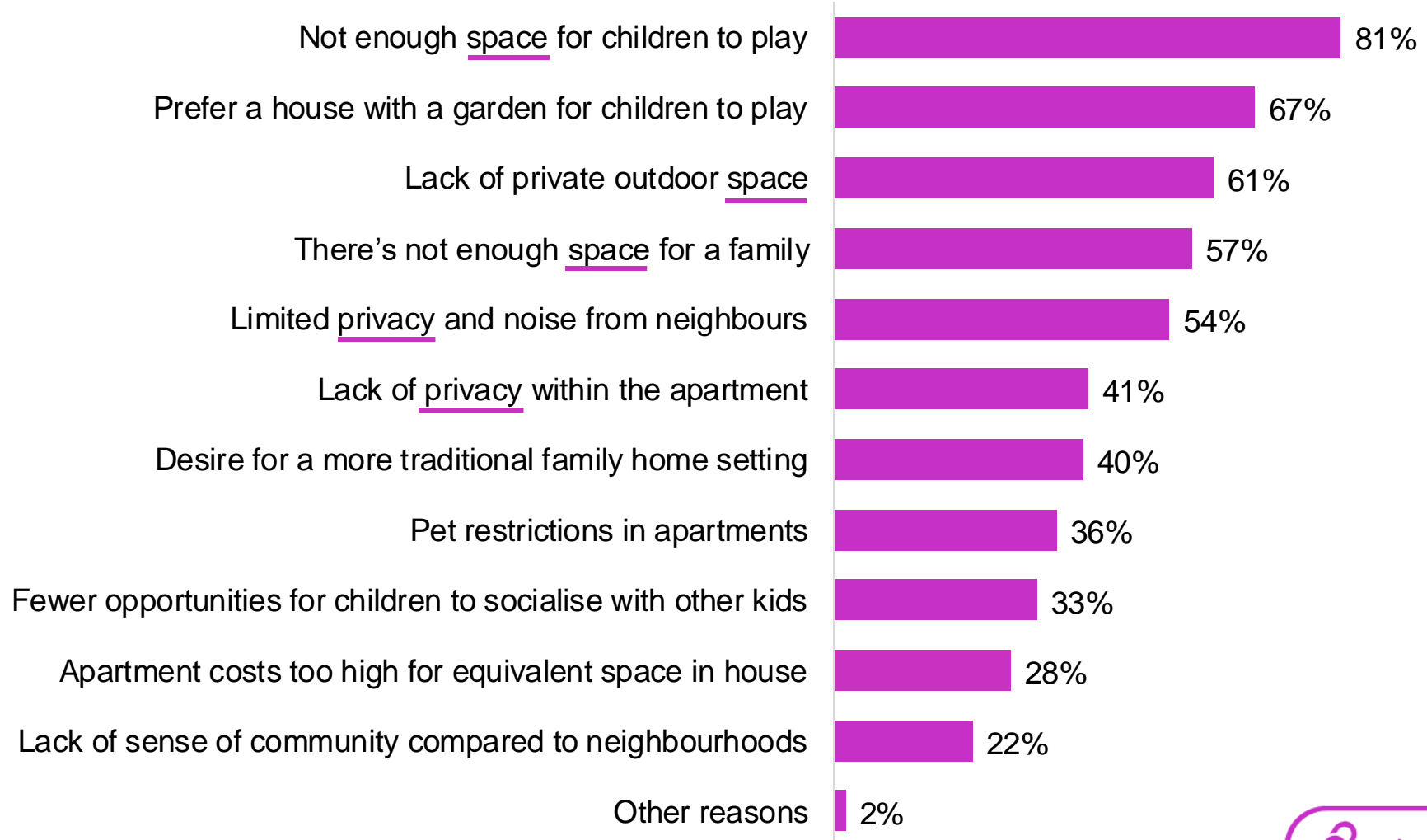

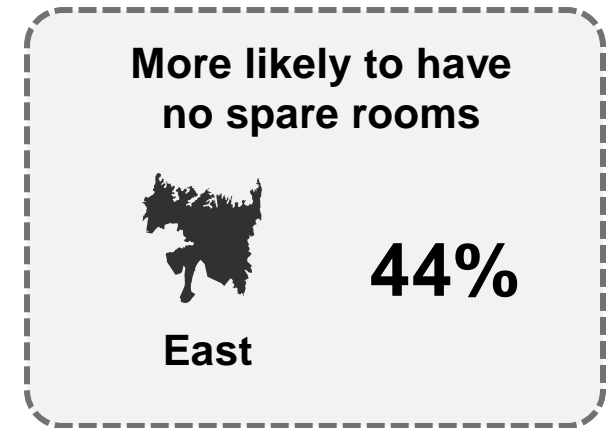

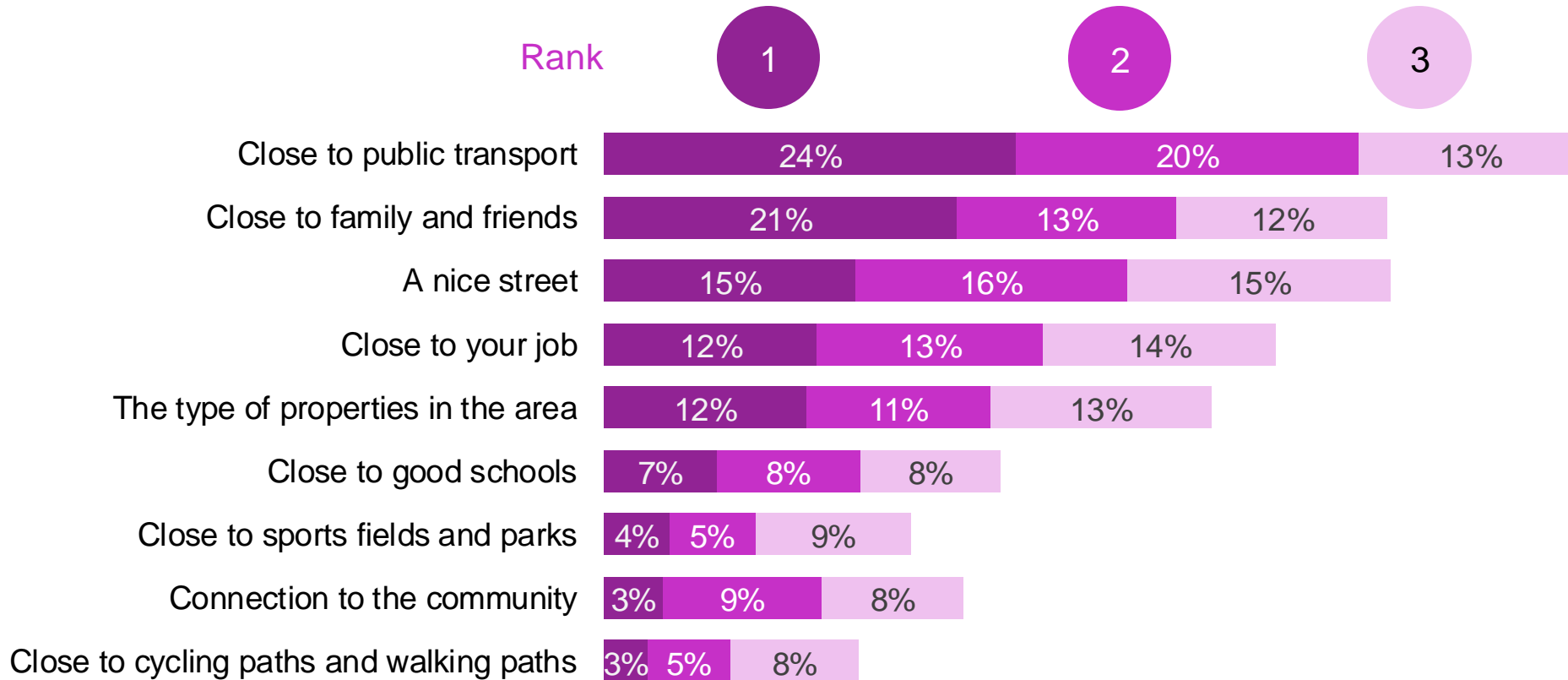

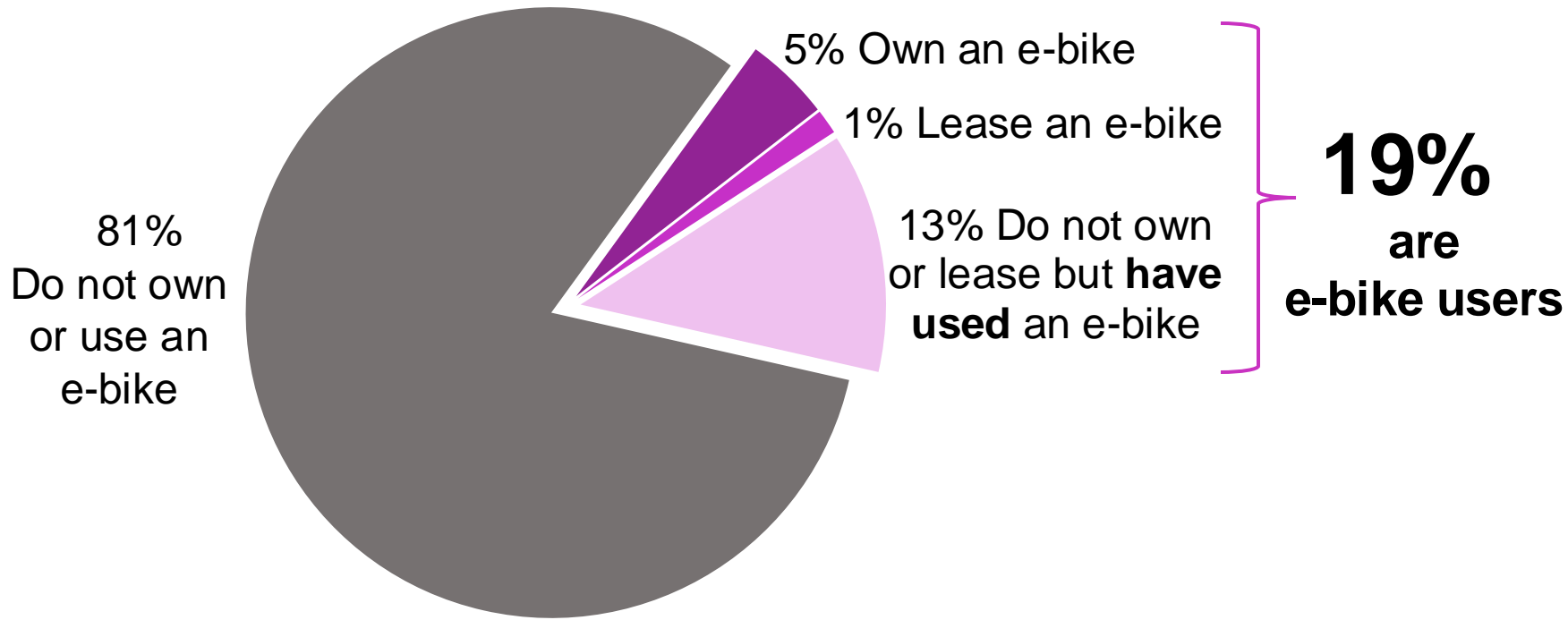

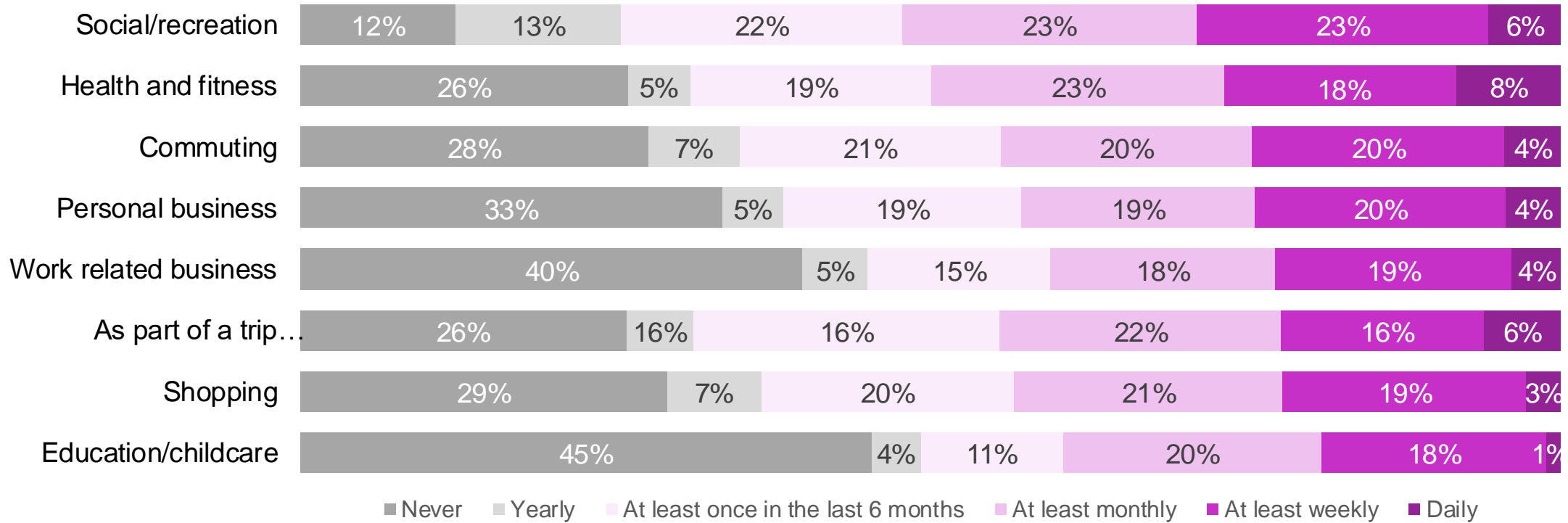

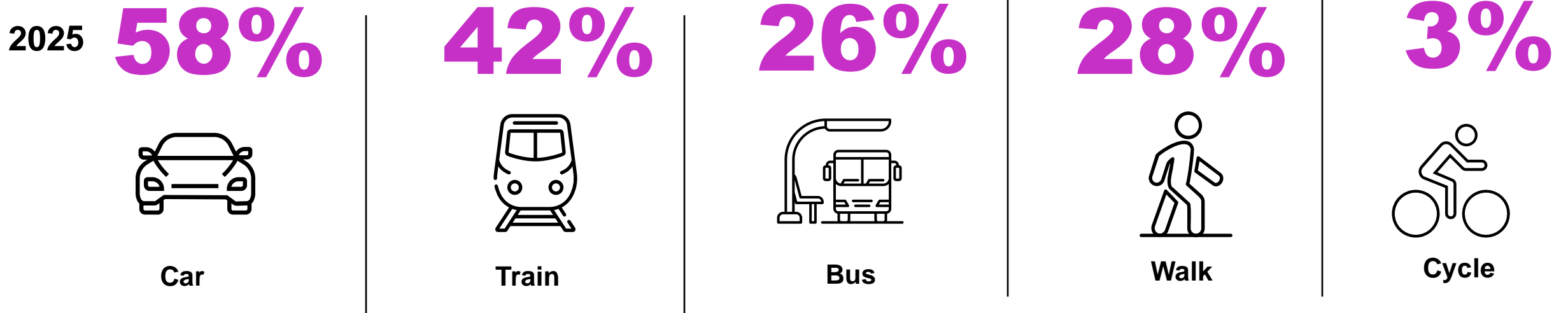

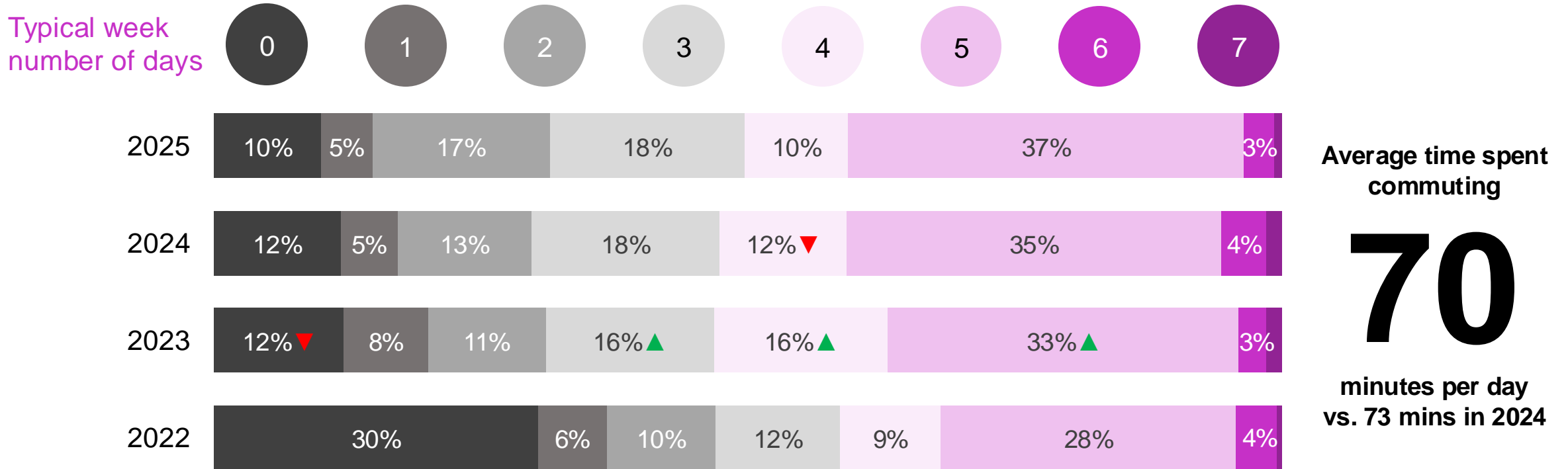

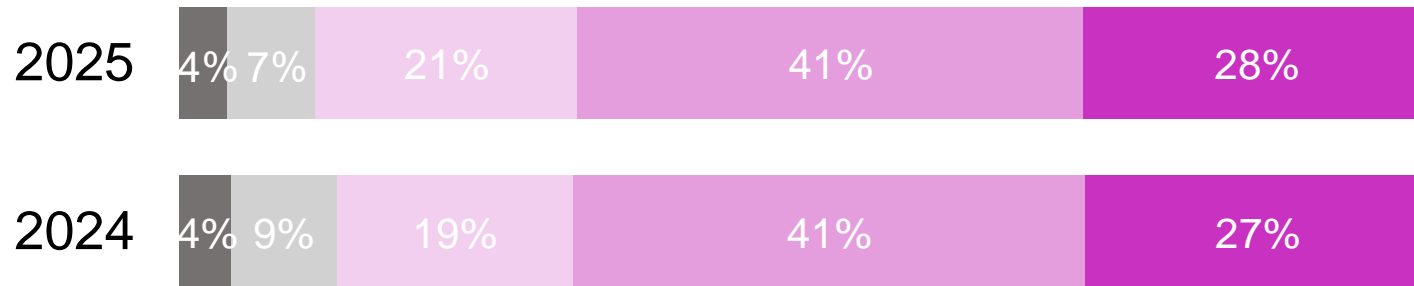

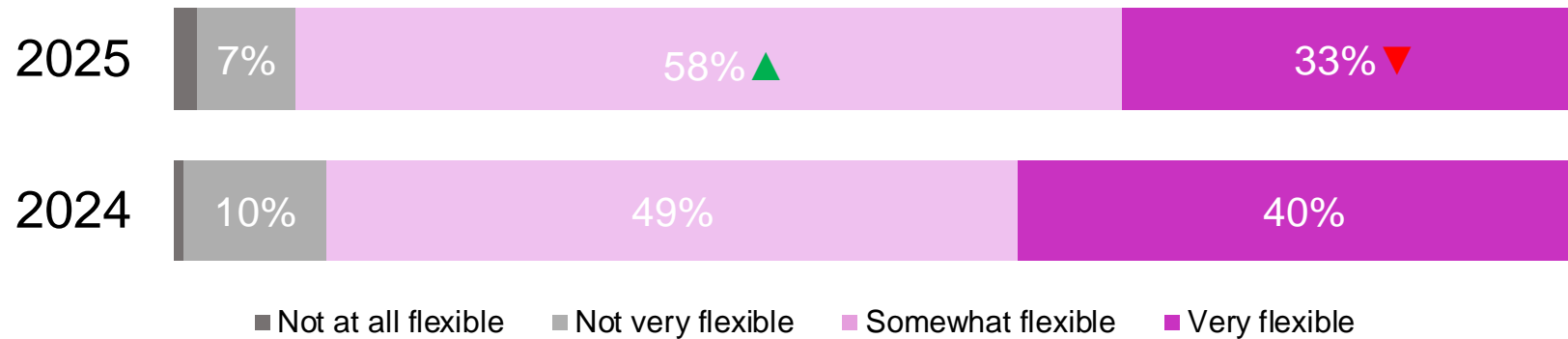

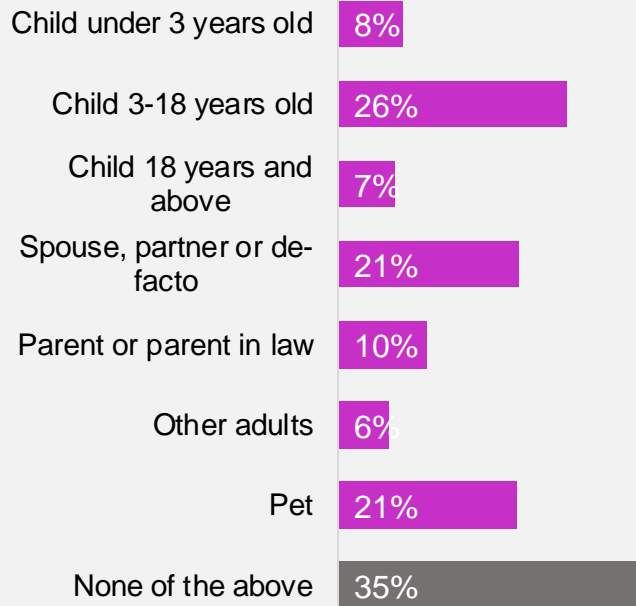

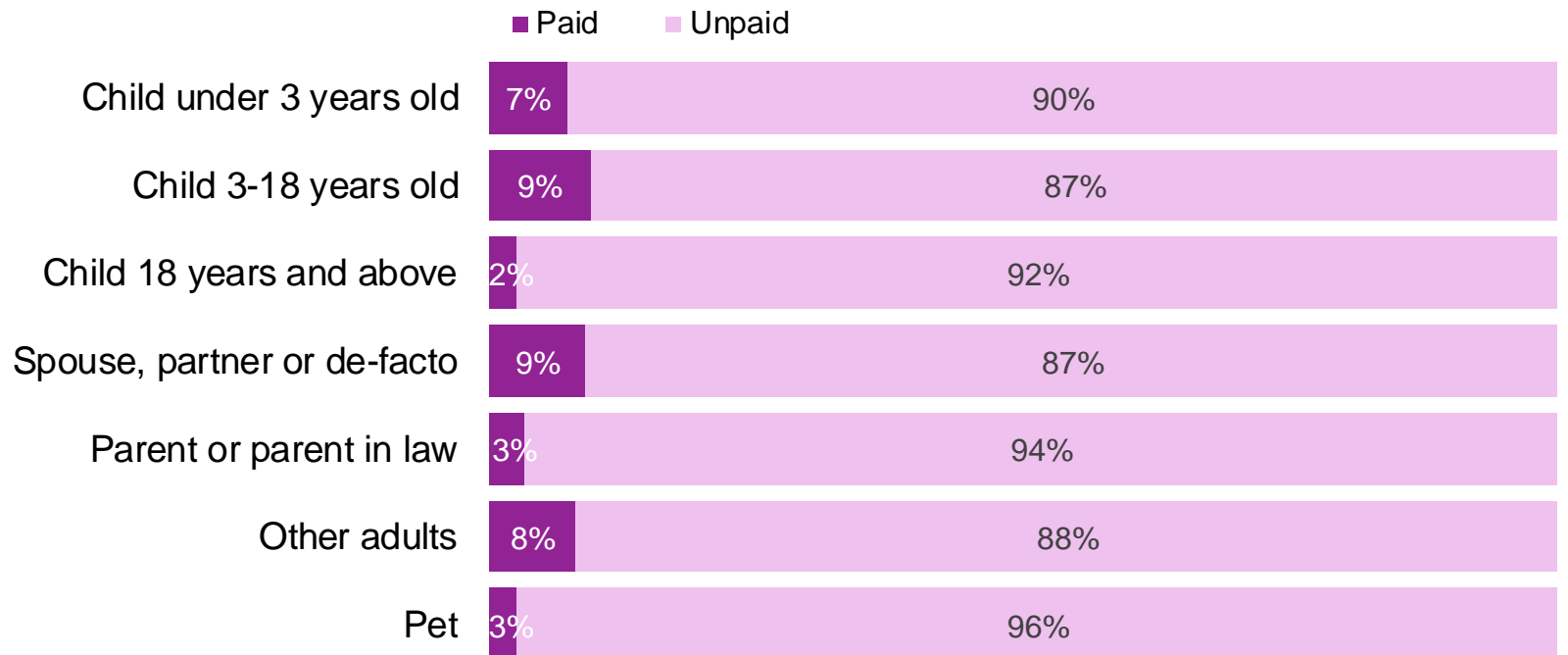

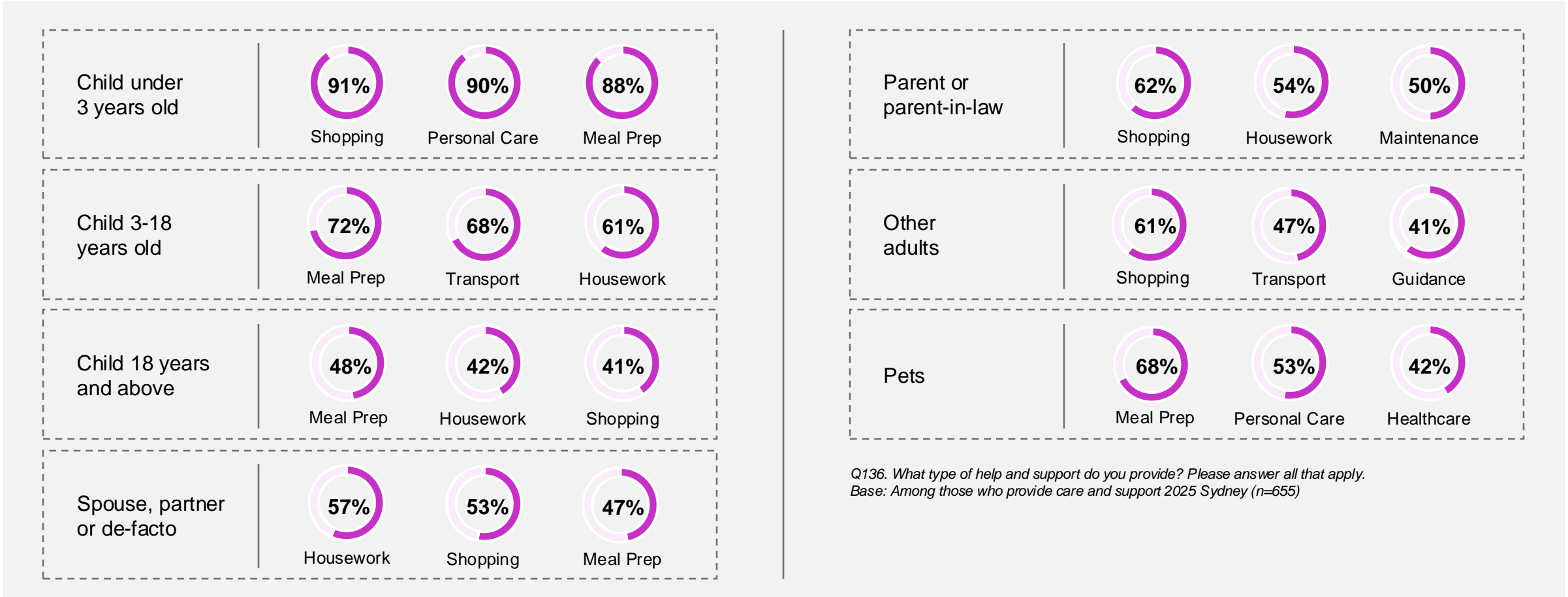

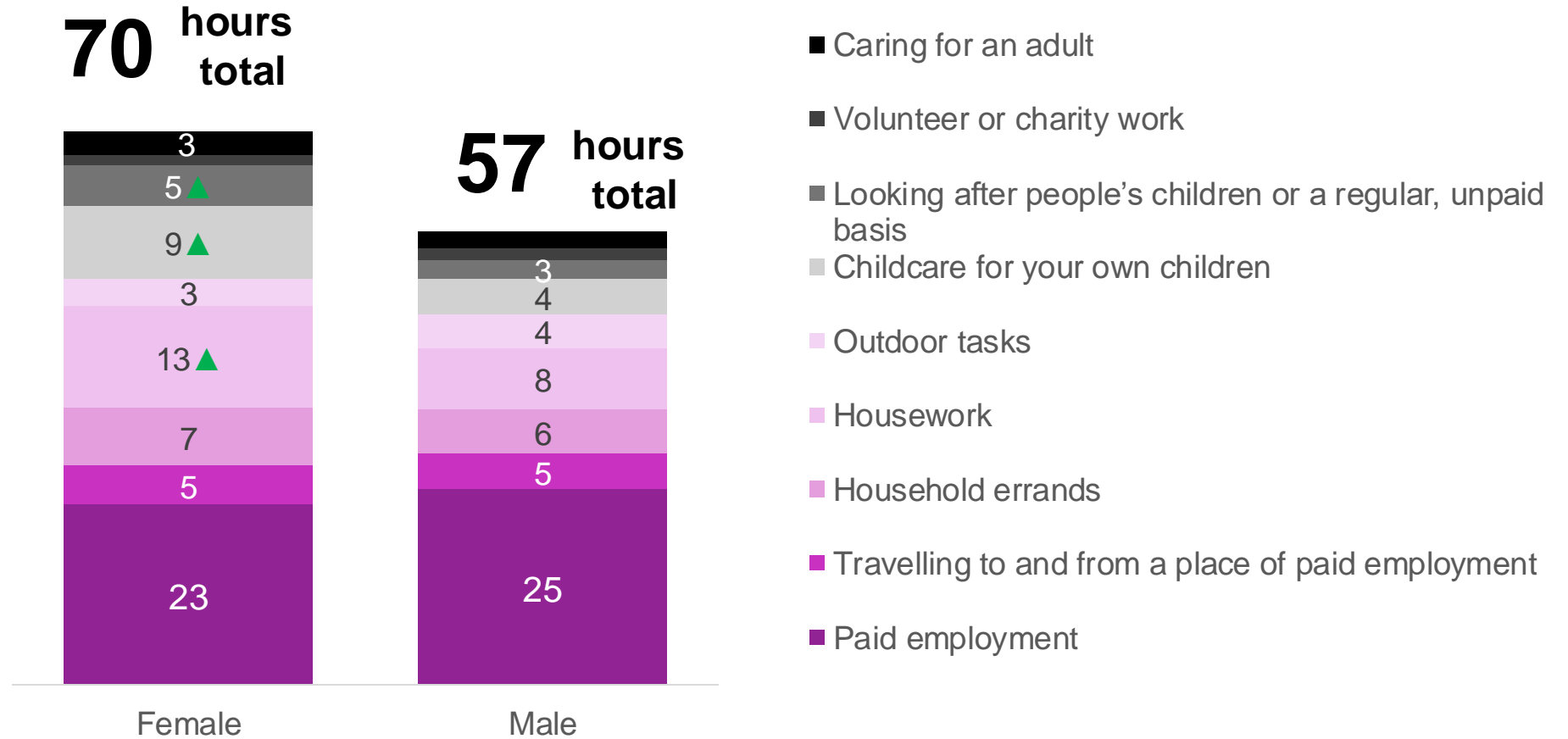

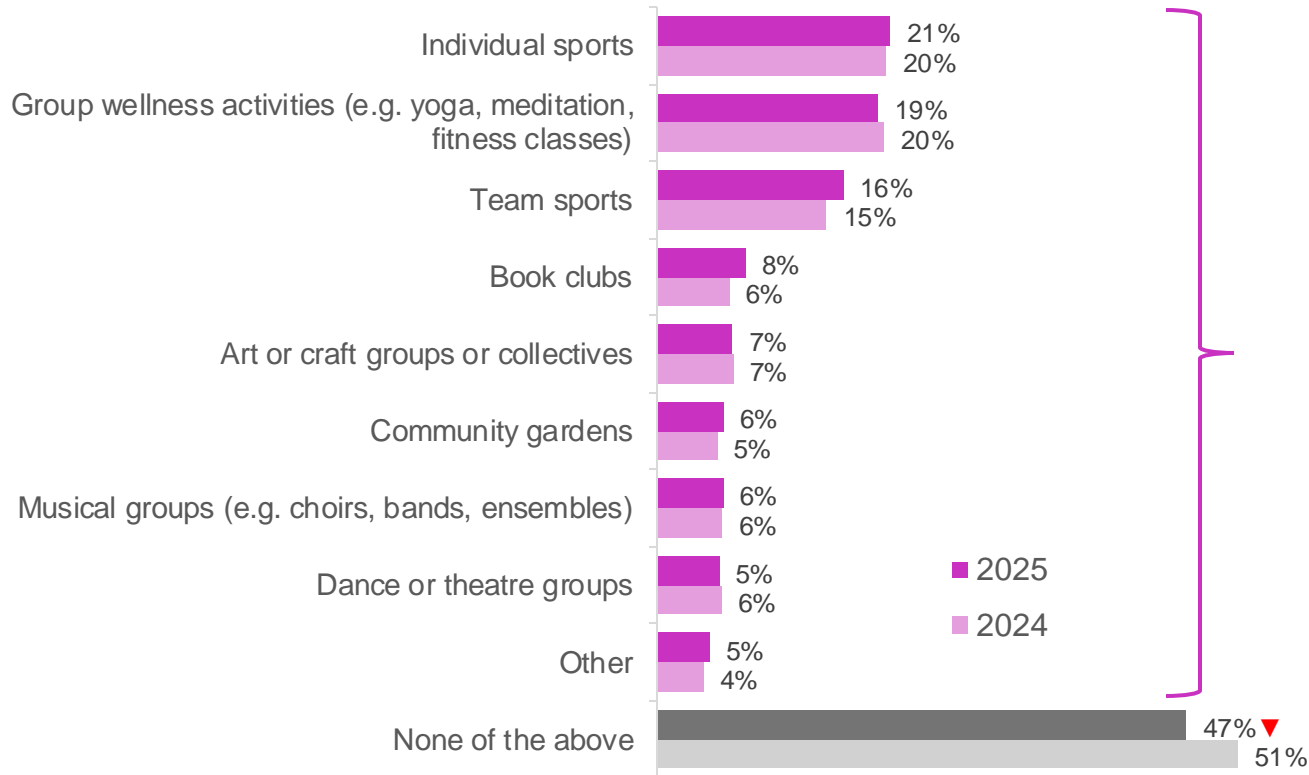

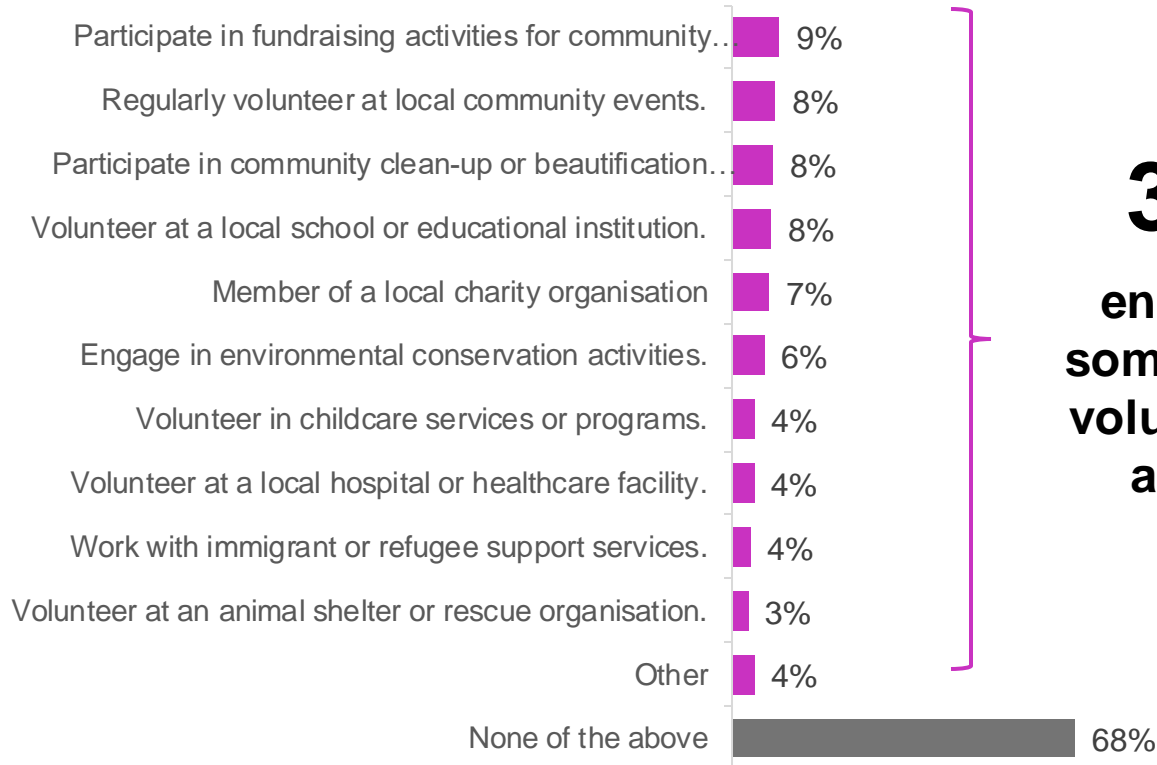

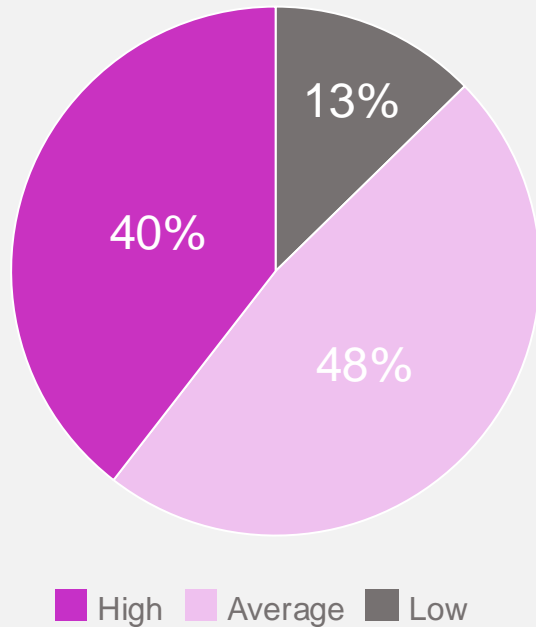

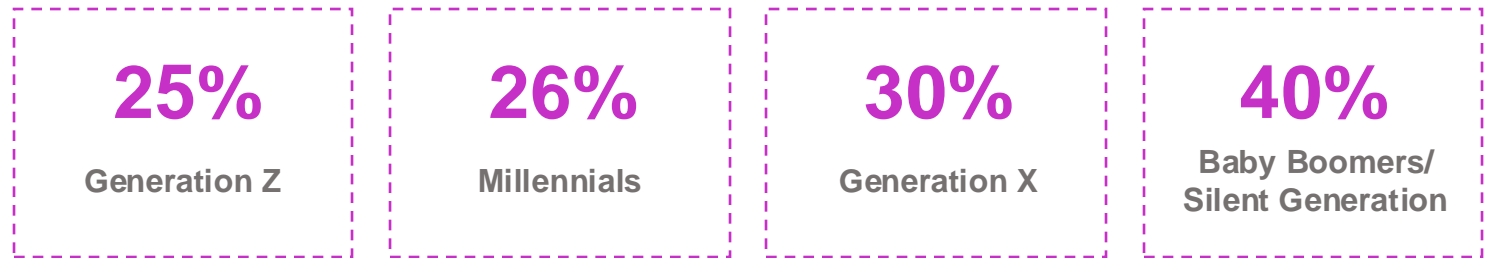

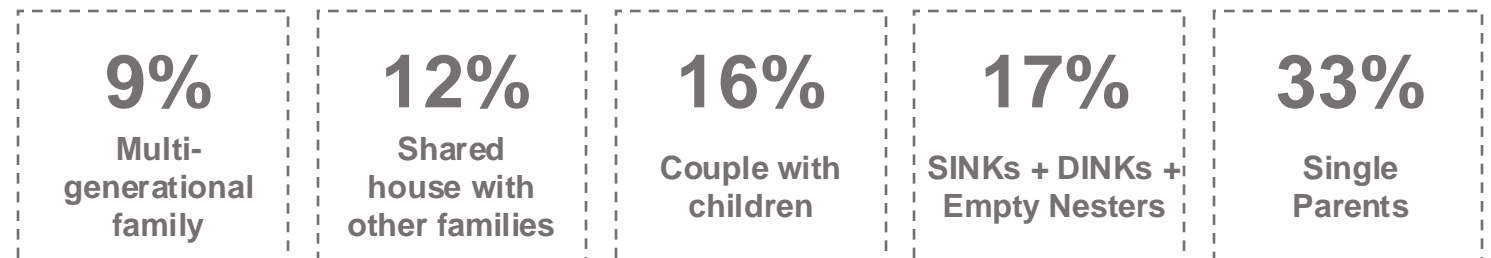

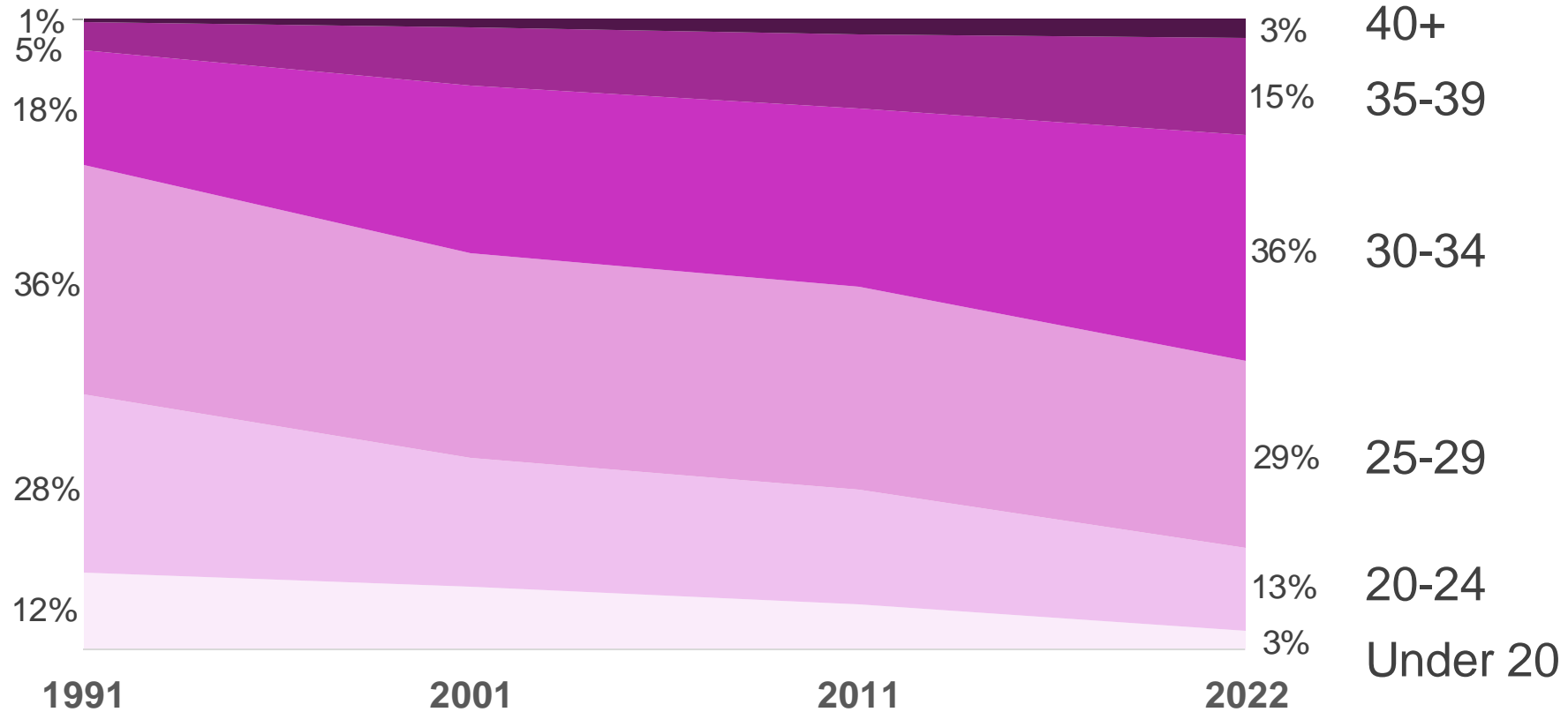

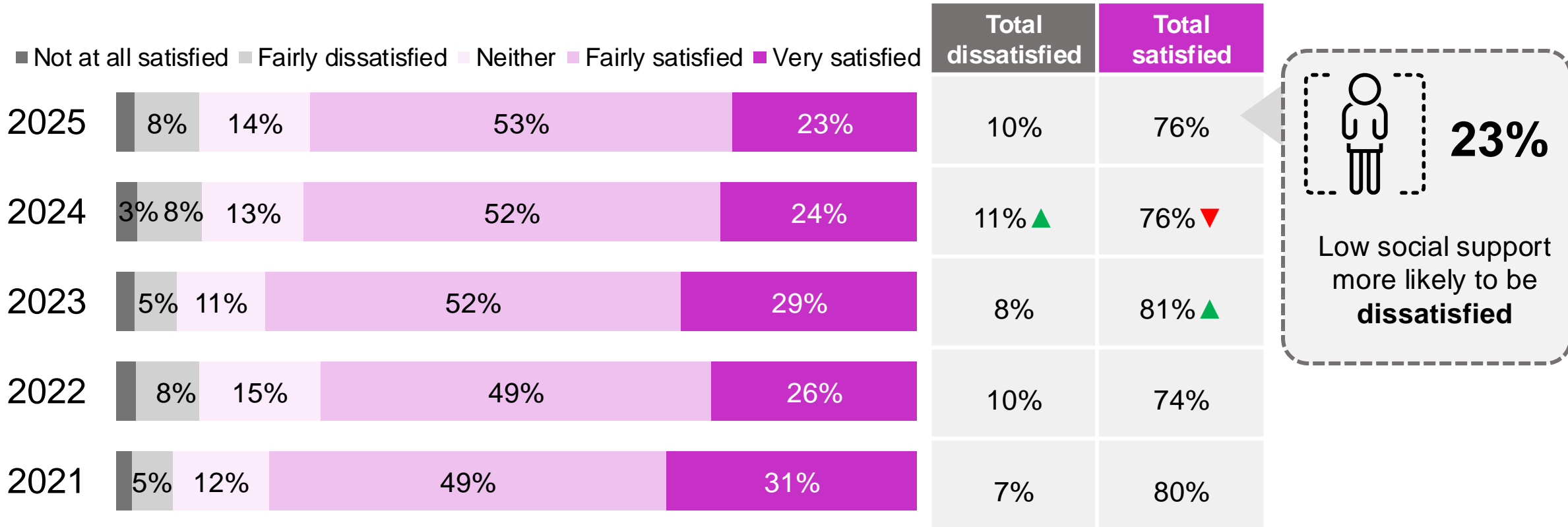

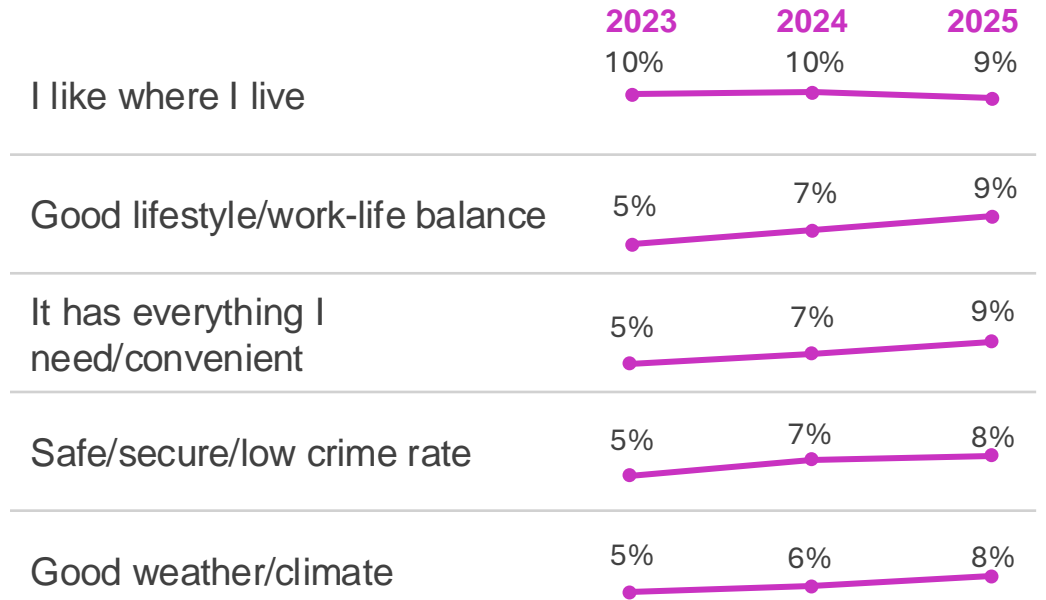
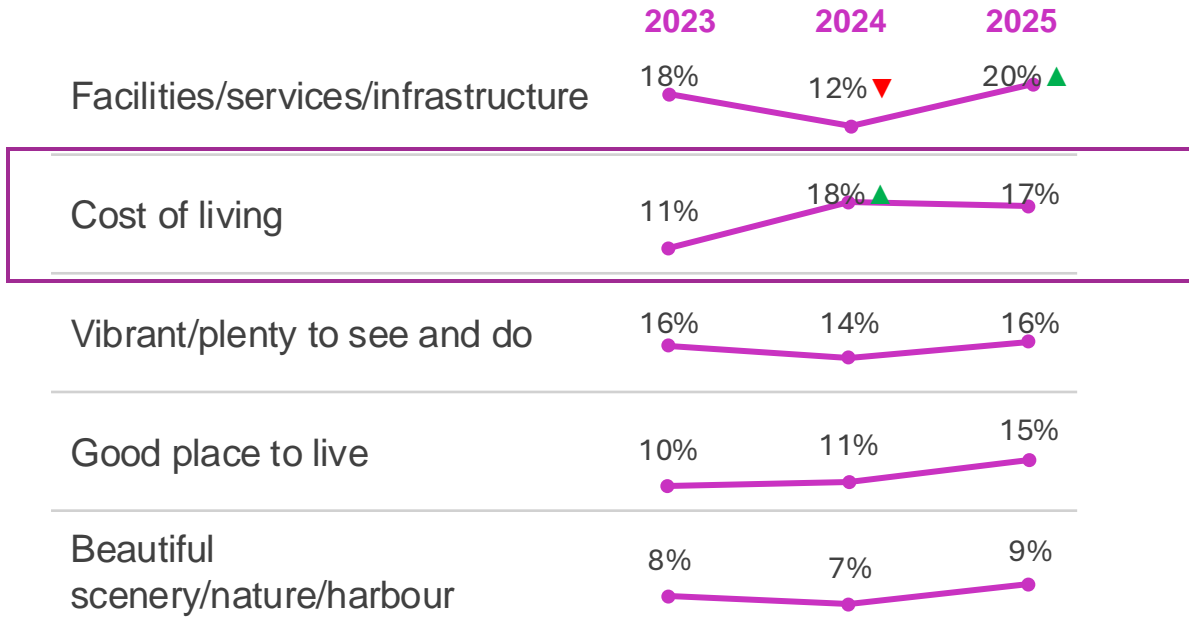


Q1. Thinking about your life in Sydney overall, how satisfied are you with your quality of life in Sydney?

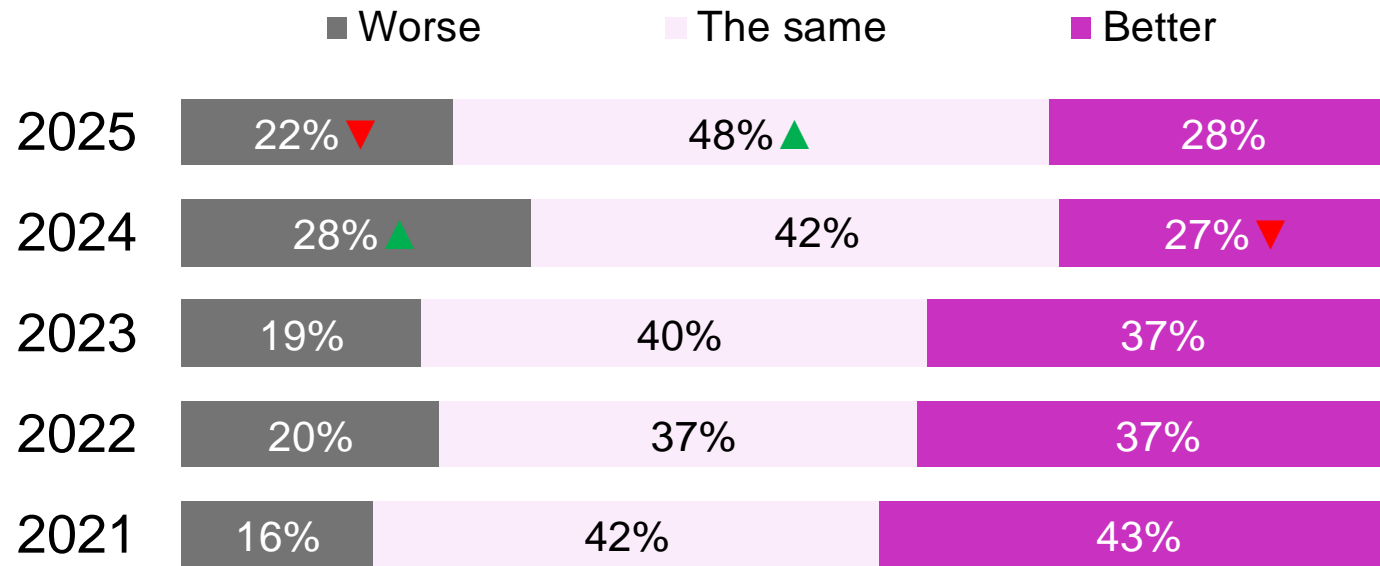

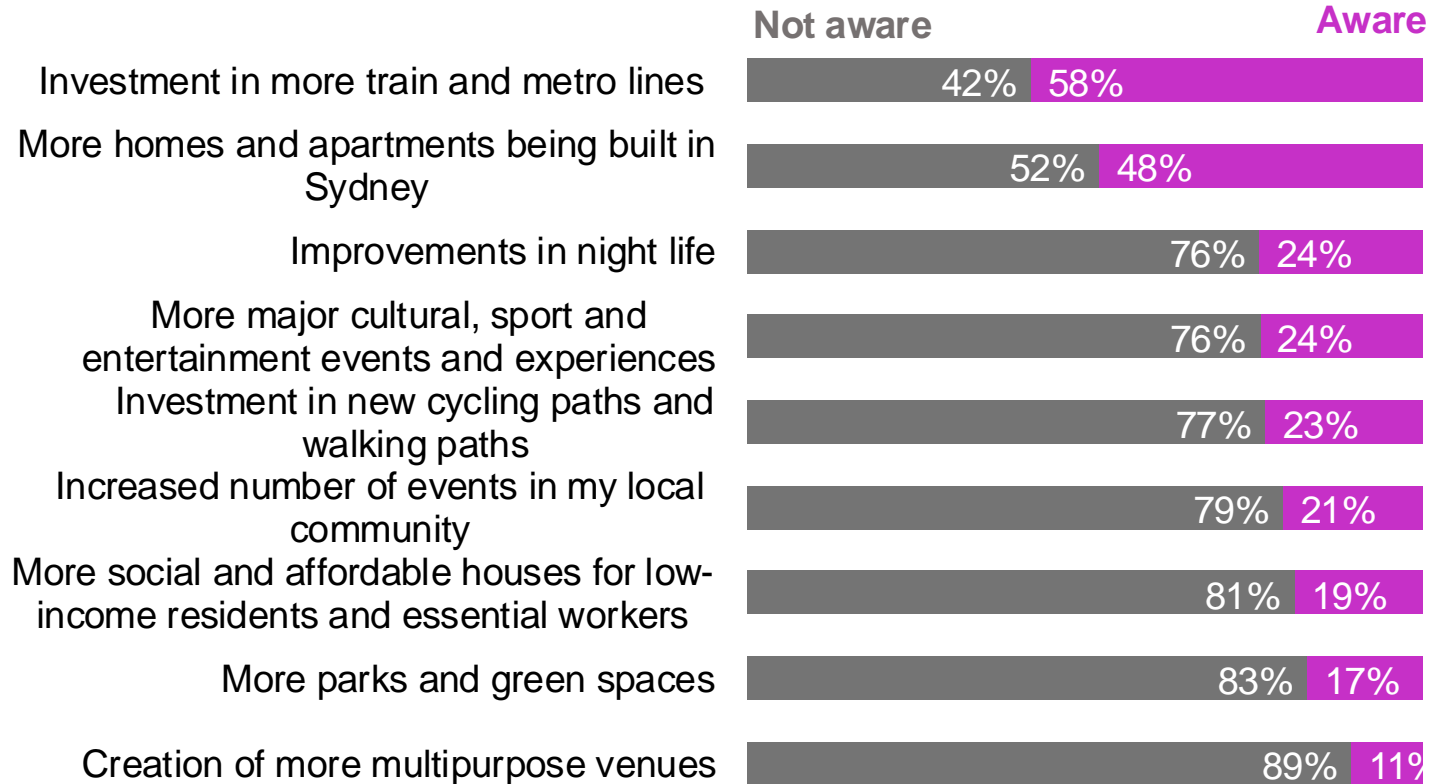

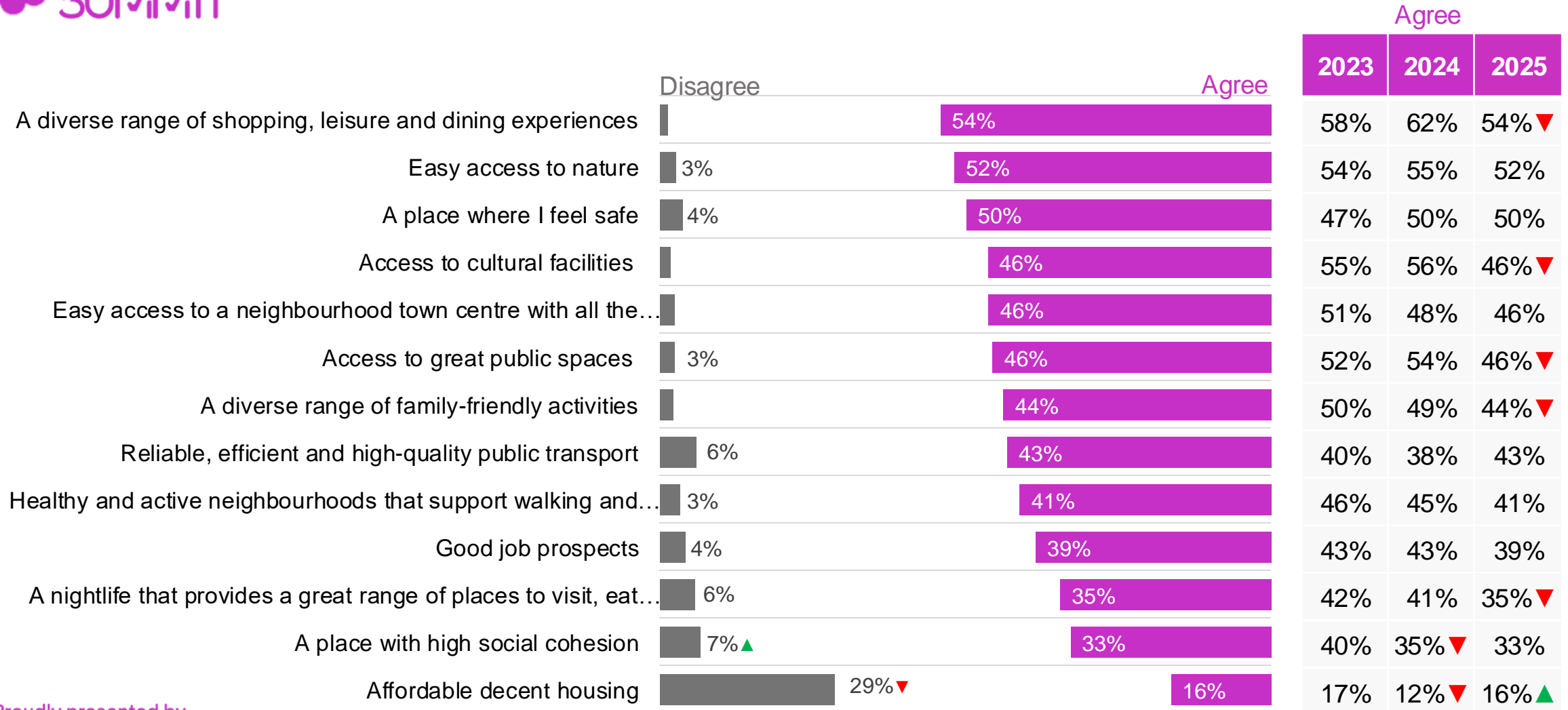

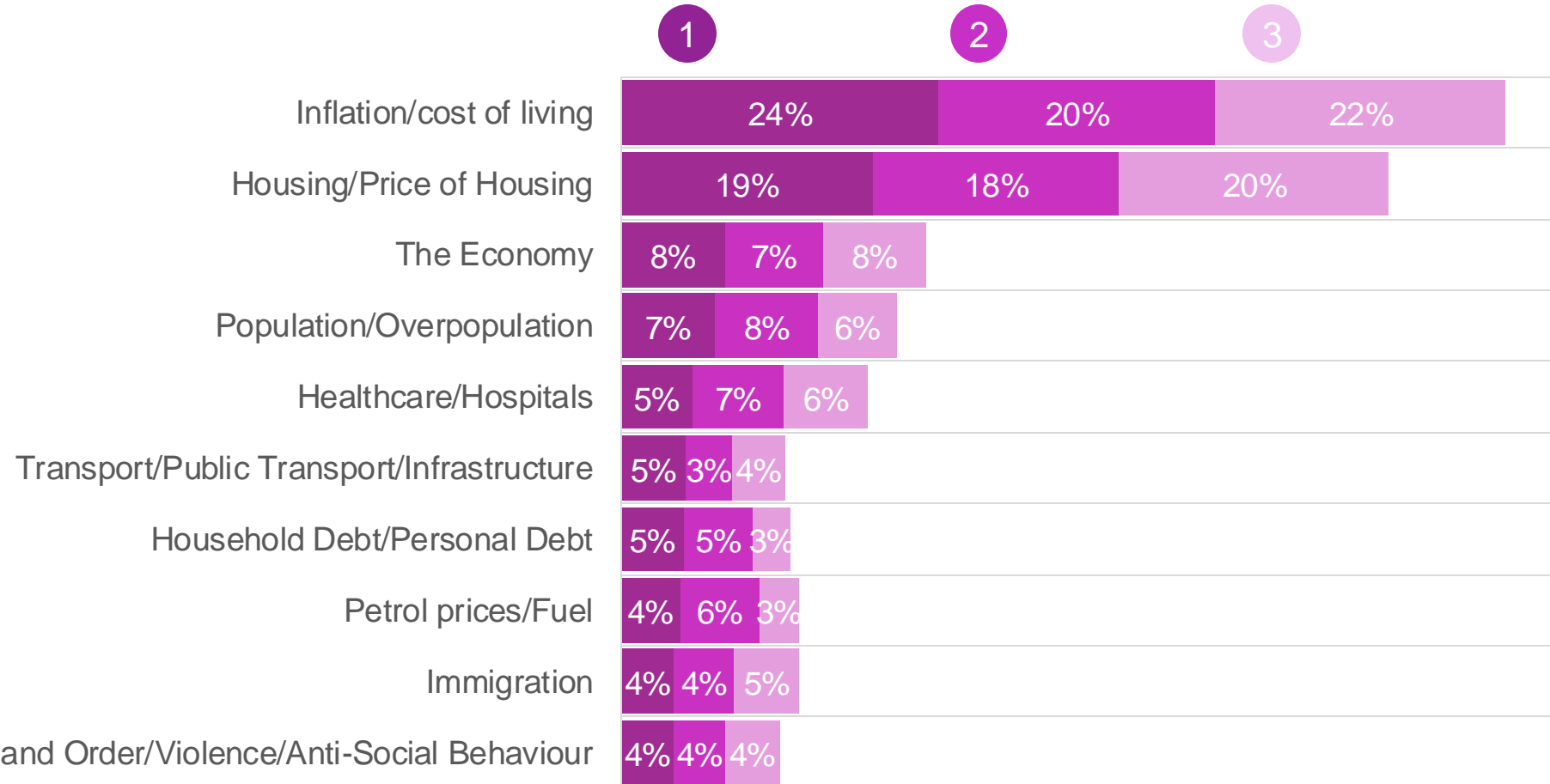
